A very warm welcome to the Autumn edition of our Community newsletter.

I would firstly like to convey the University's sadness at the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second. Our thoughts are with the Royal Family at this time.

At the time of writing this newsletter, meetings are being held to explore what changes may need to be made to Freshers' Week in light of the period of national public mourning and the state funeral. Updates will be added to the University website and circulated to our community networks – but there are still some significant schemes and projects we'd like to make you aware of.

Firstly, we have received a significant funding boost from the Home Office's Safer Streets Fund to help enhance night-time safety measures across the city centre. This bid, developed by the Exeter Community Safety Partnership and led by the University, will be used to launch a number of initiatives within the city centre. More details about these safety schemes can be found later in the newsletter.

Secondly, in June I chaired the first meeting of our Community Panel which will meet termly. This panel consists of a variety of community representatives from across Exeter and will look to support the ongoing delivery of the Exeter Civic University Agreement; help the University listen to and engage with the local community; identify local issues, challenges and opportunities. It was an incredibly productive first meeting and the team is looking forward to sharing more thoughts and ideas with our community representatives.

This year will be an exciting time for all of our student community, as they return to some form of normality following the difficult years we've faced due to Covid and once again a large part of our message to returning students will be 'get to know your neighbours'. We are supporting a number of community social events to help students get to know their local communities better. As always, we are committed to responding swiftly to any concerns around noise or anti-social behaviour. Our Estate Patrol team, Welcome Team volunteers and Community Engagement team will be working in tandem with our colleagues in the Police and City Council especially through the first few weeks of term, resolving problems as promptly as we can.

## New Community Panel

**The first meeting of a newly established Community Panel took place in June this year, Chaired by our Registrar, Mike Shore Nye.**

The aim of the Community Panel is to help the University of Exeter to identify local issues, challenges and opportunities, and to support the development of an annual plan of community engagement.

The Panel will provide us with an opportunity to listen to and engage with the local community and be more responsive to the needs of all social groups.

We connect with communities in a variety of ways, but the new panel will seek input from a wider cross-section of city residents to help us co-create solutions that meet local needs.

The Panel was formed to support the delivery of the Exeter Civic University Agreement, which was signed by leaders of the University of Exeter, Exeter City Council, Exeter College, and The Royal Devon and Exeter NHS Foundation Trust, in October 2021.

The next panel meeting will happen in October and we look forward to providing further updates on new projects and ideas in future editions of the community newsletter.

## Community Funding News

A bid developed by Exeter Community Safety Partnership and led by the University of Exeter, has received a significant funding boost of £680,250 from the Home Office's Safer Streets Fund to help enhance night-time safety measures across the city centre.

This funding will be used to launch a number of initiatives within the city centre to help prevent anti-social behaviour, and tackle violence against women and members of the LGBT+ community, in and around Exeter city centre, particularly at night.

The initiative will be focused around several key areas: enhancing the existing CCTV and street lighting network in key locations within the city, specifically looking at routes from the city centre night time economy to residential areas, delivering bespoke bystander intervention and educational training for key groups, enhancing key areas of the local community to help promote personal safety and the provision of a safe space.

Peter Scargill, Director of Commercial, Residential & Campus Services at the University of Exeter and Chair

of the Exeter Community Safety Partnership said: "The success of our bid reflects the excellent collaborative working by all of the partner organisations that form the Exeter Community Safety Partnership. I am extremely excited about the delivery of this project over the next eighteen months and the long-lasting benefits it will provide to all members of Exeter's community who use the night time Economy".

In November 2021, the partnership was also awarded more than £72,000 from the Home Office's Safety of Women at Night Fund, to help tackle night-time crime in the city.

We're excited this year to be working closely with the Exeter Community Garden, based on the edge of campus near Higher Hoopern Lane. The Garden has just celebrated its 10th birthday, and continues to go from strength to strength. If you're in the area please do drop in and see what the team are growing and harvesting!

We also have a large number of Student Societies with a community-focus. At our Guild Awards ceremony this year, Student Project of the Year 2022 was Action After Stroke, a long running project providing a safe and supportive environment for members to exercise in. The sessions involve a mix of light rehabilitation exercise and social support for up to 25 stroke patients who have progressed beyond what the NHS provides. This year the project has recruited 40 student volunteers, attending sessions twice a week on the St Luke's campus. Some of the patients supported by the project have been attending for over 20 years! We're really proud and impressed that Exeter students have been dedicating their time to this project and making a difference to people's lives for more than 2 decades.

## Community update: Community Engagement Officers

**‘Community Engagement Officers’ will be the new name for the ‘Student Community Wardens’.**

The Student Community Warden scheme was first launched in 2008, to advise and support students living in private accommodation. The Wardens are all students in their final year of study, who have lived in the community for at least one year. The team are often first point of contact for many Resident Associations in the city.

The new title was resolved following feedback and consultation with students earlier this year.

*The title Community Engagement Officer is much more reflective of the breadth of engagement work that the team does. We also discovered that the term ‘Warden’ did occasionally confuse some students who assumed that our team were employed by the City Council. The new team will also undergo some new, targeted, community-safety training (supported by the Safer Streets Fund) to help educate students about personal safety.
