Exeter student receives prestigious award from Prime Minister

Environmental campaigner and University of Exeter student **Amy Bray** received the Points of Light award for her work on fighting the climate and ecological crisis. Amy, who is studying marine biology at the Penryn Campus, is founder of the charity **Another Way**, which empowers people to become more eco-friendly.

Amy set up the charity at the age of 16. Three years later, Another Way has opened two zero-waste shops, planted 12,000 trees, and inspired over 4,000 people to make changes to live more sustainably.

“I am honoured to have been recognised by the Prime Minister for my work with Another Way alongside so many other individuals doing wonderful things for their communities,” said Amy.

Crucial testing for sub-sea cable protection takes place on campus



Renewable Energy experts at the University of Exeter have carried out crucial testing for the next generation of sub-sea cable protection equipment.

Swedish company Greenpipe Group has recently completed a test programme on their range of Snap Panzar sea cable protection products at the University’s Dynamic Marine component test facility (DMaC), based at Penryn Campus.

The products are designed to ‘snap’ around existing underwater cables that are showing signs of wear and tear through time, to help preserve their lifetime and prevent the need for replacement.

Dr Pete Halswell, from Exeter’s Renewable Energy department and part of the research team said: “This research has allowed the Greenpipe Group to develop their product from a shore based solution to an offshore solution to cable protection, which is essential for reliable offshore renewable energy generation.”

Climate Change policy decision-making tool “highly commended”

A simple tool to help local authorities and other organisations use the latest evidence to adapt to climate change in ways that benefit human health was highly commended in the international Climate Challenge Cup, as part of COP26.

The Local Climate Adaptation Tool was developed by the University of Exeter and Cornwall Council with support from Cornwall-based non-profit organisation Then Try This.

Professor Emma Bland, of the University’s European Centre for Environment and Human Health, based in Truro said: “We were thrilled by the exciting opportunity to showcase research that could have real benefits to local people, helping organisations tailor the best solutions to climate change to benefit their own communities.”



Using creativity and technology to tackle trauma

Researchers from Falmouth University and Oxford University have teamed up with clinicians, academics and service providers from across the UK to explore how creative practices can play a role in tackling the effects of adverse childhood experiences in children and young people.

The study hopes to spark a change in the way mental health is understood and then addressed by community services.

Anna Mankee-Williams, Senior Research Fellow in Technology and Innovation in Health and Care at Falmouth University said:

“Using arts as a therapeutic practice isn’t new - but blending technology, psychology and cutting-edge creative practice to develop products and services is a bold step.”

Shaping the future of care in rural communities

The Connected Health Care research project, led by Falmouth University, is asking whether satellite connectivity can help deliver mental health care, diabetes care and clinical education in remote communities.

For the next stage of their study, they’re looking for unpaid carers who can help the team understand the pressures facing carers in rural and isolated areas, and what support might help them in future.
