The Community Survey is carried out every three years to take stock of the University's relationship with the city and to help update our Community Engagement Strategy. The last community survey was carried out in 2014.

Results from the survey are combined with feedback we receive through our bi-annual Resident Liaison Group meetings and from 'StreetWise' calls and emails throughout the year. This information is then used to revise our Community Engagement Strategy. This plan details a range of campaigns, projects and initiatives undertaken by the University and Students' Guild to enhance community relations.

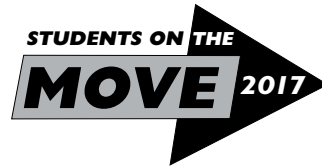

The Students on the Move project should be well under way by the time this newsletter has been distributed. The scheme comprises a series of University-subsidised waste collections each Monday and Friday, for students moving from private accommodation at the end of the academic year. Weekly collections occur as normal between these times. Since the scheme began in 2009, we have expanded the project to collect re-usable items and food. We also offer to 'caddy' glass to bottle banks for students without vehicles. The scheme was initially developed when we observed that not all students left their premises on their last bin-day and the quantity of refuse at the end of the year can be significant.

The scheme will also offer two large-scale 'community cleanup days' for all residents in ten streets in the St James Ward. Residents in participating streets will receive an information leaflet soon.

If neighbours observe any large quantities of waste, please look for the 'Students on The Move' collection sticker that should have already earmarked the refuse for a collection. Unfortunately, the scheme can be mis-used by a small minority of landlords and builders. If you have any concerns about an address, email streetwise@exeter.ac.uk and we can check our pickup schedule.

The Food Action Project

Students from the University of Exeter are joining forces with a local charity by distributing unsold food to the city's homeless community.

The Food Action Project focuses on reducing the amount of edible food within the sell-by-date that goes unsold in shops, cafés and restaurants across the University, whilst also helping those who struggle daily for food within the city.

Organiser Alec James, VP Welfare and Diversity for the Student's Guild and former Geography student, hopes that food outlets across Exeter will eventually join the project.

A team of the Guild's Exeter Student Volunteers, already 50-strong, transport food from campus to the charity Exeter Food Action, homeless shelter Gabriel House or Safesleep or directly to homeless shelters every Wednesday and Friday.

"I've set up the basics for this project, but I really hope it expands in the future. It's in the hands of the two Exeter Student Volunteer project leads now and I know they have ambitions to work with campus services to see if food can be sourced from halls of residence. The scheme has the potential to expand into the city. It is hoped it will grow to the extent where it can work with local businesses to help deal with unsold food responsibly both day to day and at special events."

In the last year sixty premises signed up to be members of the programme, which promotes responsible management and operation of alcohol licensed premises and aims to make Exeter a safer and more vibrant place for those living, working and visiting the city.



The group held an event to mark the two-year anniversary at city centre venue, Rosies, which saw venue managers from across the city attend, to hear from speakers Dominic Borg, Best Bar None Chairman; Mick McDonnell, Best Bar None National Co-ordinator, Rt Hon Ben Bradshaw MP and Superintendent Sam de Reya, Devon and Cornwall Police.

After beating off some tough competition the Exeter scheme also achieved national recognition in January, being voted in the Most Innovative Scheme award At the Best Bar None (BBN) National Awards held at the House of Lords.

These include free guided tours of the Bill Douglas Museum, Sculpture Trail, Campus Grounds and the Jubilee Water walk.

The Exhibition will round off with a free family activity day, which will take place on Saturday 17 June, from 11am – 4pm.
