## Student Community Warden Scheme

This year, a new team of Student Community Wardens will be patrolling residential areas of Falmouth.

Run by the Students' Union (FXU) and funded by Falmouth University and the University of Exeter, the pilot scheme will promote neighbourly behaviour and support good community relations.

Working with the Town Council and other partners the Wardens will be speaking to all residents to offer advice on everything from dealing with rubbish, to housing problems and noisy neighbours.

Harry Bishop, Students' Union President Community & Welfare said, "A personal, face-to-face approach is the best way to break down barriers in the community and to proactively start conversations. This is an immensely positive step in developing and continuing to improve relationships in the community."

Pending its success, it's intended that the scheme will continue after its pilot year and expand to include more areas in Falmouth, as well as Penryn and Mabe.

## Student fundraising reaches £78k

Falmouth and Exeter Students' Union raised a total of £78,762.45 for charity last academic year.

Most of the fundraising was achieved by the Union's Raise and Donate society which organised challenges, events and campaigns, including international marathons and sponsored skydives.

Over the summer, applications opened for this year's Charity of the Year and a new 'Local Cause of the Year' was introduced, to make sure that the local community benefits from the fundraising efforts. The elected charities will be announced in September.

## Exeter research student part of all-female crew on plastic pollution voyage

An all-female crew on a mission across the Pacific to learn more about plastic pollution, included a University of Exeter student from the Penryn Campus. Over the summer, the eXXpedition North Pacific voyage crossed the “Great Pacific Garbage Patch” - the densest ocean plastic zone on the planet.

The team on the research vessel Sea Dragon sailed more than 3,000 nautical miles, studying micro-plastics and links to environmental and human health, and raising awareness of the impact of single-use plastic in the world’s oceans.

The crew of 24 included Emily Duncan, a PhD researcher as the head of science on leg one. Emily said: “We had many exciting projects to collect data for on board which will really aid in building a better picture of the extent of plastic pollution in the North Pacific.”

## Supporting sport in Cornwall

The University of Exeter, sponsors of the Cornwall School Games, jointly hosted the Summer Games with Penryn College this year. It’s the first time such a large scale event has been hosted across both campuses, with around 4000 children taking part, from 100 schools.

In addition to sporting events, groups of primary and secondary school children walked a mile route around the campus throughout the day. It was a joy to be able to welcome so many young people on campus to use our facilities and compete in sporting activities.

Our aim is to help increase the participation of young people in Cornwall in PE and school sport - across all levels and abilities.



## Schools’ Event on Campus

Falmouth University again hosted the annual CreatED awards, showcasing the best creative work by GCSE and A Level students from across the county.

24 local schools took part in the exhibition on campus and prizes were awarded to students in categories including product design, fashion and textiles, and film and animation.

Senior Deputy Vice-Chancellor Geoff Smith said of the exhibition, “Every year we’re delighted to see and support Cornwall’s creative talent. Not only has Cornwall got a rich creative heritage, the Creative Industries are now the fastest growing sector of the UK economy, and it’s these skills that will be that will be key to our future economic success.”
