Making space for nature in Cornish towns

The University of Exeter has been working with Cornwall Council on the Green Infrastructure for Growth 2 Project, part funded by the European Regional Development Fund.

This exciting project works with existing green spaces and road verges to improve them for wildlife and for people, by introducing rivers of wildflowers and riotous spring bulbs, tree planting and sensitively placed benches and picnic tables to allow people to relax and enjoy the sites. The University's role is to help monitor the impacts of the changes and to provide closer links between the University and Cornwall Council.

Tevi support continues until December 2022

Tevi has been granted a two-year project extension to continue supporting small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) across Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly to help them transition to more sustainable ways of working.

Tevi's unique offer helps to develop Cornwall's circular economy whilst supporting Cornwall's Environmental Growth Strategy. The work is led by the University of Exeter, delivered in partnership with the Cornwall Wildlife Trust, Cornwall Council and the Cornwall Development Company.

Over the last two years, Tevi has had several notable successes, such as finding solutions to pressing environmental challenges through the Tevi Challenge Network, supporting small businesses to find innovative ways of working more sustainably and distributing grant funding to support a variety of new projects.

Filming starts on Enys Men

The film, which is shooting in West Cornwall, is set in the 1970s on an imagined island off the coast of Cornwall. The horror story will centre on a woman haunted by echoes of both the past and the future.

Falmouth University's economic contribution to Cornwall

Falmouth has recently commissioned an independent report, looking at the economic benefits it provides to the local community and Cornwall as a whole.

The study showed that Falmouth University acts as an economic anchor, keeping skilled and talented young people in the region. Falmouth has recently been named as the best university for business in the UK, producing the most students (almost a quarter) going on to lead or start up their own business.

Falmouth is also a major employer and purchaser in Cornwall, supporting more than 2,000 jobs in the county. In total, the University is responsible for generating £1 in every £109 of economic activity in Cornwall.

Connecting through creativity

You might have noticed an increase in artworks around Falmouth recently, thanks to Fine Art student Lily Peach-Forster who launched a new community arts project called *Street View Falmouth*. The project saw more than 80 homes and businesses display work from professional artists, students and local schoolchildren.

As well as strengthening ties between local artists and residents, and providing a literal window to showcase their work, Lily said that the aim was to spread joy and bring the community together during lockdown.

"It's very easy to feel isolated when you're stuck inside for large parts of the day. Getting people outside really helps with general wellbeing and mental health. Connecting people to an artistic environment is a really positive, creatively driven thing to do."



wAVE Project rolls out

Launching next month, the *wAVE (Augmented and Virtual Experiences) Immersive Experiences in Museums Project* will transform five Cornish museums, bringing their exhibitions to life with future tech.

A team of academics from Falmouth University worked with the Cornwall Museums Partnership and five participating communities in Bude, Looe, St Agnes, Porthcurno and the Isles of Scilly to support economic diversification through digital innovation.
