
to tackle health

inequalities in Cornwall

The universities of Falmouth and Exeter have joined with Plymouth University in a Cornwall Council-led project awarded £4.96m from the National Institute of Health and Care Research to tackle health inequalities in local communities.

Cornwall Council cabinet member for adult social care and health, Andy Virr said: "This will help us to accelerate research and develop innovative solutions to tackle these issues so that residents can live a healthier life."

Director of Public Health, Rachel Wigglesworth said: "Health determinants include things like employment, housing, education and the physical environment. By understanding how these factors are affecting people we can make sure that decisions made for people in Cornwall are based on what is really affecting their health and wellbeing."

Camborne School of Mines

We were delighted to welcome Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal to the Camborne School of Mines (CSM) last term. She was met by students, staff and representatives from the Cornish community for a tour of the mining school to learn more about its vital role in developing the UK's Critical Minerals Strategy, and global sustainable mining. This included visiting our state-of-the-art laboratories, the pioneering Deep Digital Cornwall exploration suite and the CSM museum.

The Princess Royal also unveiled a plaque to officially commemorate the launch of CSM's new Mining Engineering Degree Apprenticeship programme.

The visit coincided with celebrations for CSM's 135th anniversary and for 30 years of being part of University of Exeter, Cornwall.

international film festival

A film crewed almost entirely by students, graduates and staff from Falmouth University's Marine & Natural History Photography BA has been announced as the Best UK Short Documentary winner at Big Syn, the world's largest sustainability film festival.

Directed by graduate Caylon La Mantia and senior lecturer Anna Roberts, *KELP!* focuses on the marine plant that forms underwater forests and is regarded as an emerging super-solution due to its ability to absorb carbon, replace plastics and at the same time regenerate the ocean and its wildlife.
