

STEPS TO A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

We've made a sustainable start to the year with a host of new initiatives and planet-friendly projects.

- February saw Penryn step up to silver in the Hedgehog Friendly Campus Awards, a reflection of work by the grounds team to create a diverse and welcoming habitat for these shy and retiring nocturnal mammals.
- Sustainability Week in March featured a packed line-up of eco-oriented events to help students and staff live a more environmentally conscious life. Highlights included foraging walks, open forums and conservation volunteering sessions. This annual event is led by the Students'

- Union in collaboration with Falmouth University and the University of Exeter.
- Last year we maintained an additional 4.5 acres
 of wildflower meadow and installed signage.
 These dedicated areas boost floral diversity and
 provide a foundation for a more biodiverse habitat.
 Wildflowers encourage more insects which, in turn,
 support more birds, bats and bees.
- Our Sustainability Café now has an updated 100% vegetarian and vegan menu, as well as an amazing view – come and visit! The campuses' Food and Drink team actively engages with suppliers to reduce the environmental impacts of its operations, using South West suppliers wherever possible.

Refill with us - and reduce packaging

Our Sustainability Café is now running a new local milk refill initiative. Buy a litre of Cornish Trewithen Dairy semi-skimmed milk in their branded glass bottles for £3, then bring back your clean, empty bottle and refill it each time for £1.10.

Call into our Penryn Campus Shop, which has launched a Bring Your Own (BYO) self-service refill section to reduce unnecessary packaging. The new refill range includes a selection of cereals and breakfast food, pasta, rice and snacks.

Targeting net zero by 2030

The University of Exeter has brought forward its carbon net zero target to 2030.

After declaring an environment and climate emergency in 2019, the University set out a plan to reach net zero before 2050. But, based on support and input from students and staff, this has been accelerated to 2030.

The ambitious new target covers direct emissions (known as Scope 1 & 2) and – crucially – also includes Scope 3 (all other indirect emissions caused by the University's activities, such as purchases).

"We want to lead the higher education sector in the drive to net zero," said Exeter's Provost Professor Janice Kay, co-chair of the University's Environment and Climate Emergency Board. "To achieve this, everyone must play their part as individuals, teams and colleges, through action in our offices, labs, buildings, working practices, through learning opportunities and even the way we travel to work and study."






Students smash charity fund-raising target

A team of students from the Truro Pre-Hospital Emergency Medicine Society (PHEMSoc) ran the Falmouth half marathon for West Cornwall Search & Rescue Team in March, beating their £1,000 target to raise nearly £2,000 for the charity. PHEMSoc organises emergency medicine training sessions, teaches lifesaving skills (such as the Restart a Heart initiative) and raises money for lifesaving charities.
