## **Migration Linguistics**



# **Research Interpretation**

Engaged public collaborators (i.e., those lived experience and providers) in interpretation of study findings from intervention an components analysis (ICA) to examine key components or change processes that might be helpful/unhelpful in reducing parental domestic violence and abuse (DVA), mental ill-health (MH), and substance misuse (SU).
