## EXETER EXPERTS CONTRIBUTE TO *OCEAN*

University of Exeter, Cornwall researchers advised on *Ocean* – Sir David Attenborough's new film and book, released earlier this year. Dr Casper van de Geer from our Centre for Ecology and Conservation worked with Sir David's co-author Colin Butfield. The book brings together the biggest discoveries in marine science from the last 20 years, including work from Exeter about the current state of the ocean and its future. Dr van de Geer says, "... as showcased in the book, there is hope if nature is given the space it needs to recover."

## FALMOUTH'S 'BASKET SHARK' MAKES WAVES



A striking 20-foot mechanical sculpture of a basking shark has journeyed from Falmouth University to Plymouth to raise awareness of marine pollution. Hand-crafted from materials such as salvaged bamboo and willow, the 'Basket Shark' was created by staff and more than 100 students at the University.

After joining the Surfers Against Sewage Paddle-Out Protest at Gylly Beach in May and a residency at Falmouth's National Maritime Museum Cornwall, the shark was paraded through town for World Ocean Day. In July, it joined The Shark Trust at Plymouth's Royal William Yard for educational workshops. "Basking sharks are particularly vulnerable due to marine pollution, ghost net entanglement and global fishing pressure from shark finning practices," says senior lecturer and project leader Duncan Cameron. "This is a protest delivered through handmaking, storytelling and creativity."

## FESTIVAL INSPIRES SCHOOLCHILDREN

Last term, the University of Exeter, Cornwall welcomed over 120 Year 5 and 6 schoolchildren from local primary schools to our Penryn Campus for a fun-filled Festival of Science run by staff and students. The children visited exhibits on everything from dinosaurs and wildlife to viruses and renewable energy. Activities included building wind turbines, entering new worlds through virtual reality and learning about moths and beetles.



## POLLINATOR PATHMAKER IN CONSTANTINE

Residents in Constantine have planted a network of living artworks in the village to monitor the biodiversity benefits of the award-winning artwork *Pollinator Pathmaker*. Created by artist Alexandra Daisy Ginsberg, the artwork uses an algorithmic tool to design planting for pollinators' tastes. Featuring over 130 plant species across 17 gardens, each with 15m<sup>2</sup> of artwork planting, the study will look at the impact of the living artworks on pollinators and compare the outcomes with 15 unaltered residential gardens over the next two years.

## EXPERT'S CORNER

Chris Kaiser-Bunbury, Associate Professor at the University of Exeter's Centre for Ecology and Conservation, is an ecologist working on the conservation of plants and their pollinators. Chris has been exploring our connection with gardens and how they can be used to support pollinators in urban landscapes.



### Chris's pollinator garden tips

"Autumn is a great time to prepare your garden for pollinators," says Chris. "Leave old flower heads and stems standing to provide food for birds and overwintering sites for insects. As the garden hibernates, plan ahead to create a resource haven for pollinators in the next season. Most flowering herbs like chives, oregano, thyme, lemon balm and mint are great for pollinators. Hellebores, comfrey and bugle bloom in early spring, while sedum and ivy flower into autumn. Create wild patches with deadwood and open soil, for bees and beetles to nest, and plant meadows, if space allows, to support diverse wildlife. Most importantly, avoid pesticides, which can kill or harm pollinators."
