4 BIG questions:

- Do I need it?
- Can I afford it?

Accommodation

- Make sure you do a full inventory of your accommodation/note any damage. Keep your deposit!
- Does your accommodation include utilities (water, gas, electricity)?
- Don't forget about a TV license.
- Don't get pressured when looking for accommodation next year. Speak to us at the housing fairs in November/December





Transport: Can you walk????

Local Buses: Stagecoach: Student Card

National Coaches: National Express

Trains:

- buy a rail card, advance, off peak (not busy times)
- don't book on weekends
- <u>16-25 Railcard</u>: £35 for 1 year, 33% off travel
- Devon and Cornwall Railcard (only £12!)
- Trainline
- Split your fare
- If your train is late are you eligible for a refund?





Flights:

- book in advance
- book off peak
- don't book on weekends
- Travel to the airport. The flight might be cheap but how are you getting there and how much is it?
 Are you getting there at an unsociable/unsafe time?
- Destination: is it where you need to be?
- Bristol: Easyjet, Ryanair, KLM
- Exeter: Channel Islands, Amsterdam, Dublin, EU holiday destinations





General life expenses

Self care:

- Hairdressers: student discount? student hairdresser?
- Pharmaceutical: own brand vs named brand
- A little pampering? Check out Exeter College H2B salon
- Gym memberships: Exeter Uni, climb a hill!
- Enjoy the outdoors for free, join the Ramblers Association or Out of Doors Society!





Groceries:

- Larger supermarkets = superstores
- Do a meal plan and stick to it (including lunches/drinks on campus)
- Free supermarket loyalty cards
- Buy online in advance and get free delivery
- Buy dried food/tins in bulk to save money
- Supermarket own brands are often cheaper
- Yellow label goods!
- Cheaper supermarkets: Aldi, Lidl, Tesco.





Entertainment:

- How much money you have to spend after essentials? (rent/food/utilities/travel etc)
- Is there a student discount available?
- Is there a discount through your mobile contract (ie. Cinema)?
- Speak to your friends establish who is paying for what before you start ordering
- Tips in the UK 10-15% for restaurants if the service has been good.







How to avoid scams and keep the precious money you have

Criminals are clever.

They are spending a lot of time and effort to get your money.

Average student loss to scams: £2k

Average international student loss to scams: £45k

One Exeter student lost over £80k this July

STUDENT FRAUD TYPES TO BE AWARE OF:

Immigration/Visa Fraud

What happens:

You get a call or a message where someone says there is a problem with your visa. They say you must pay now or you will be deported or arrested.

Warning signs:

- The caller sounds angry.
- They ask for money quickly.
- They say "don't tell anyone".



2 Accommodation Fraud

What happens:

You see an advert for a room or flat online. They tell you that you have to pay a deposit before you view the property or pay 6-12 months upfront, but the property is not real.



Warning signs:

- You can't view the place in person.
- Payment is asked for in cryptocurrency.



Tuition Fee Fraud

What happens:

You get a call or a message from someone claiming to be from the finance team and ask you to transfer your fees into a different account.

Marning signs:

- They want you to pay outside of the university portal.
- They ask you to transfer money or pay in gift cards or cryptocurrency.



4 Fake Job Offers

What happens:

You see an online job which says you can earn "easy money" or "quick cash". They offer a lot of money for not very much work. Often you can unknowingly be laundering criminal money.



Warning signs:

- They ask you to use your own bank account to send money.
- They say they will pay you in cryptocurrency or gift cards.



Virtual Kidnap

What happens:

You are contacted by someone pretending to be an official from your home country. They tell you that you have been accused of a serious crime. They tell you not to contact anyone, including your family. They tell you to check into a hotel room, and take photos/videos of yourself bound and blindfolded. These are then sent to your family to blackmail them for money.

Warning signs:

- You receive contact from someone claiming to be from your home country unexpectedly.
- You are told not to contact anyone.
- You or your family are being threatened.



If you are unsure of any phone calls or messages, contact the university. They can help you to check if it is real.

If you have been a victim of fraud, the UK police can help you. Call 101 on your phone, or visit 101 online.

Keep your money and your identity safe

- Don't carry all your cash/credit cards at the same time
- Don't share your passwords/safewords/PIN
- Have different passwords for different things
- Check your area if using a cash machine
- Budgeting apps: MoneyLover, Clio, Hyperjar
- Online banking: Starling, Monzo, First Direct
